Susan Palo Cherwien – A poet and musician, Susan received her bachelor's degree in church music and voice from Wittenberg University, attended the *Spandauer Kirchenmusikschule*, Berlin; completed the *Abschlussprüfung* in voice at the *Hochschule der Künste* Berlin and a Master of Liberal Studies from Mundelein College, Chicago, where she focussed on spirituality, ritual, and the arts. Susan has composed numerous hymn texts which appear in denominational hymnals in the United States, Canada, and Europe and has written for *The Lutheran, Christian Century, CrossAccent, Gather,* and *Word and World.* She is the author of the hymn text collections, *O Blessed Spring: Hymn Texts of Susan Palo Cherwien*; Vol. II: *Come, Beloved of the Maker;* and Vol. III: *Peace, Be Still* (all with AugsburgFortress); as well as hymn festival reflections collected in *Crossings: Meditations for Worship, From Glory Into Glory: Reflections For Worship,* and *To God I Give My Melody* (all with MorningStar); Susan also edited the sacred vocal collection, *To God Will I Sing* (Augsburg Fortress). She served on the ELCA Language Consultation, whose work set language guidelines prior to the development of *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*.

Programme Notes

Crux Fidelis chant (Fortunatis, c.530-609)

Part of a larger work written in 570AD, Fortunatis presented this music and text to Queen Radegunda for the procession of a piece of the real cross. What is sung today is the refrain from its larger work, *Pange Lingua*.

Adoramus Te, Christe (Palestrina, 1525-1584)

Published in 1587 in Palestrina's second book of motets, this text is of the prayers associated with the Stations of the Cross.

God So Loved the World (Stainer, 1840-1901)

This piece is movement #9 from Stainer's oratorio, *The Crucifixion* (written in 1887). Intended for church choirs to sing, this oratorio also includes 5 hymns for the congregation to join in on.

The libretto for *The Crucifixion* follows scriptural narrative with newly composed verses. This movement is the one choral movement using biblical words.

Christus Factus Est (Bruckner, 1824-1896)

Composed in 1884 and influenced by Wagner's music, Bruckner has composed this piece with bars of rest inserted into the music. Each of these 'stopping places' moves the music into a new intensity. The first recording was in 1928.

Missa Brevis #13 in G minor ("Holy Cross", 1960) (Willan, 1880-1968)

This 'short mass' was written in 1960 (and published in 1961) for the Anglican choir of St. Mary Magdelene (Toronto). Today, the quartet sings three of the four movements (Kyrie, Sanctus, Agnus Dei).
